


Beach Bum Fun





between us, of course, especially our language. At times we had a hard time understanding one another. Also we found that they put sugar on things such as yogurt which we did not.

The French students went to school with us but we only had "school" on a few rare days. On the other days we went on trips: we visited an Indian reservation; we climbed Mount Orford, and we visited Sherbrooke. My family also took us to see places in Montreal. I found these trips interesting but the best was yet to come.

Many tears were shed at the departure of the French twins, even though we would see them all in one year. During that time we maintained contact by writing back and forth.

Since the students going to France were scattered in several classes we couldn't work on the Exchange Project in class. Once a week all twenty-one of us met with the two teachers going with us. We then decided to call ourselves "Les Jeunes Explorateurs."

We studied the history of France, prepared fund-raising activities and worked on things we were to present in France. Among those were Quebec square dances, songs, and baseball - a game unknown to them.

As the days became hotter and the month of June came closer, we all became more excited. The passports were obtained, the dances perfected, the speeches given - all was ready.

The flight to France was very enjoyable, except that, since we had the last seats, we were all scattered throughout the plane.

It took about an hour and a half to get from Paris to the villages where we were staying, Villiers - le Bade and St. Aubin, even though they were only thirty kilometres from Paris.

We arrived in the morning, very tired but happy to see our "twins." We were accompanied by our school principal, two teachers, and two other adults. A photographer from La Tribune came along.

The three weeks we spent in France were an unforgettable experience. Getting used to French food, the strong French accent, and eating supper at 8:30 p.m. were all different but interesting things to live with for a few short weeks.

Visiting Paris was great fun; the Eiffel Tower and Notre Dame Cathedral were special. We saw so many chateaux of the Loire Valley that we actually became tired of them.

The visiting of famous places was enjoyable and

something to remember, but for my part I liked the other activities just as well. We rode ponies around our village, we went swimming, and went on picnics.

One very interesting thing was the "Kermesse," the school's activity day. Each class put on a performance, and we demonstrated our dances which the French really liked.

I was struck by some of the differences between France and Quebec. School finished at 4:30 p.m., they had Wednesday off, and had school on Saturday morning. In one village almost all the houses were identical, and so little property per house! We all agreed that Canada was better.

Our return to Quebec went very well, and quite a few parents were waiting for us at Mirabel.

Just a few weeks ago, all of us participating in the exchange met again. We laughed again over our funny experiences, school pictures, and we were able to see each other again.

We all had different opinions, different views, but almost all of us agreed on one thing; If another exchange like that came up and we were able to participate, we would. It was one experience I will never forget.
