That is the reason that she leaves a present in each home because He just might be there.

In England, a nice round log brought in by all the family members is burned in the fire-place. Following customs, a coal kept from the previous Christmas is used to light This log. This rite is supposed to bring luck to the coming year.

In Finland, "Hauskaa" or Christmas is celebrated quite differently. In barns, children sleep
on straw, like Jesus in his
manger long ago. Santa Claus
has gifts out for them when th
they awake in the morning.

In Denmark, a nest little creature called Judnisse is introduced, and only the family cat can see him.

In Switzerland, the Christmas season begins the sixth of December with the coming of Santa Clause.


GALT SPORTS UPDATE
